PRAYER

The early years of the Australian Catholic Church are known widely as the priestless years, as the colonial authorities did not permit the predominantly Irish Catholic population to have a priestly chaplain. Fr Jeremiah O'Flynn, who came to the fledgling colony without permission to practice as a priest, was arrested and deported within months. For the time being the practice of the Catholic faith in this land consisted of praying the Rosary.

In 1844 the first provincial synod of Bishops to be held in Australia recognised the important role of Mary in the lives of the faithful and she was invoked as the Patron Saint of Australia under the title Help of Christians.

COLLEGE PRINCIPAL

In October 1820, the newly arrived Fr John Therry established the first Catholic school in Australia, placing it under the stewardship of former convict George Morley. And so, the journey of Catholic Education in Australia began.

Our earliest Catholic schools were staffed by lay women and men with the support of parents and, later, the colonial

government. In an attempt to relieve tensions between Catholic and protestant Christians Governor Richard Burke provided funds for Catholic churches to be built on the basis of matching whatever money could be raised by the community. Bishop Polding, who arrived in Sydney in 1835 took advantage of this opportunity to build many Churches which served a dual purpose as school rooms.

It was also Bishop Polding that first invited religious congregations of sisters and brothers to Australia to work in an increasing number of parish schools. And when the NSW Public Instruction Act was passed in 1880, leading to the withdrawal of government funding from Catholic schools, religious sisters and brothers became almost the only workforce available to educate Catholic children. On the Northern Beaches the Good Samaritan sisters, the first order to be established in Australia, assumed responsibility for a great number of primary schools, including those in our Manly Freshwater Parish.

Partial Government funding was restored in the 1960s, but Catholic schools received only a small portion of that which public schools were built upon. Gradually this funding improved, particularly in the early 1990s.

Catholic schools have now stood in Australia for 200 years and educate more than 770,000 students representing 1 in every 5 students currently attending school nationwide. They are supported primarily by the Commonwealth Government receiving 15% less funding per student than public schools, which are funded primarily by the states.

Looking back, we have much to be proud of and even more to be grateful for, but we cannot take our schools for granted. The generous support of families has sustained Catholic education for many years and there is no other country in the world with a comparable system of Catholic schooling, but there are those on the national political stage that continue to advocate for reducing taxpayer support for Catholic schools.

Nonetheless, this is a year to celebrate and commit ourselves to maintaining a strong Catholic school system. And to thank you for entrusting the care of your sons' education to our school community.

As the bishops of Australia have written in their Pastoral Letter to celebrate 200 Years of Catholic Education, we have "great confidence in our young people: that inspired by their encounter with Jesus Christ and nurtured by a Catholic education, they will be young women and men of character and ideals, and will contribute as leaders and disciples in our world."

YEAR 8 COURAGE REPORT

Year 8 students this week engaged in a COURAGE session with Year 9 students about the importance of setting study routines and some useful study skills. They looked at WHY they should be learning how to apply themselves to mundane and boring tasks, such as homework or repeating exercises again and again. By the conclusion of the session, students realised

that if they invest in themselves by doing the best, they can in everything they do, then they will finish school satisfied that they have given it their best shot. Year 8 student Henry Pim wrote a brief reflection of the session:

"Miss McGregor showed us one of Warren Buffett's tweets that was really inspiring, saying 'The best investment you can make is an investment in yourself.... The more you learn, the more you will earn', which basically means that the better you do in school the more opportunities there will be for you in the future. Then we watched an intense video of Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson titled "work like hell", the message behind it was that we can accomplish anything we put our minds to, and to never give up. Then we were taught how to set a study plan for all our assessments coming up, and to stick to it by using the diary and calendar handouts. Overall, I really enjoyed the courage assembly, especially the video "work like hell" because it was really upbeat and inspiring, and I strive to be the next billionaire like Warren Buffett."

Year 8 will continue to develop their organisational and study skills throughout the week in Pastoral Care in the lead up to a busy end of Term assessment period.

YEAR 10 COURAGE REPORT

CHARACTER

The Class of 2023 has been big on adopting themes each year, all designed to develop a particular focus, appropriate to their stage of development and their collective context. In 2021, our theme is "Building Character". Year 10 have discussed that character is what we do when no one is watching. Character is understood as when we do right because it is right. It is the basis of all relationships and life skills, and it extends to our academic and sporting conduct. It is our intention in COURAGE this year to focus on building character.

John Maxwell once wrote:

"Talented people are sometimes tempted to take shortcuts. Character prevents that. Talented people may feel superior and expect special privileges. Character helps them to know better. Talented people are



praised for what others see them build. Character builds what's inside them. Talented people have the potential to be difference makers. Character makes the difference in them. Talented people are a gift to the world. Character protects that gift."

It is our responsibility, as parents and teachers, to instil in our young people as best we can, the tools that will enable them to make character-based decisions regardless of the situations they find themselves in. Therefore, character training. Year 10 have taken Lego's "Master builder" [of character] as our metaphor for why building character is so important at this stage of their lives. The graphic below explains this a little better.



Year 10 are in the midst of PEP (Personal Enhancement Plan) talks, completing careers insights on Compass, approaching

subject selection and pathway information sessions, and making big decisions that will significantly impact their post-school life. Our COURAGE sessions have never taken on more significance than they do right now. The message of each session is designed to leave the students thinking that people with good character are always in demand (like Lego!), that they can be anything they want to be (like the way Lego tantalises the imagination), and that good character is the best source of strength for life (like how a 2x2 Lego brick, weighing just 1 gram can withstand 4,240 newtons on force). Character must be built and built early.

MATHEMATICS

As we are midway through Term 2, Mathematics Assessment tasks will be upcoming for all year groups.

- Year 12 will be completing their last task before the Trial HSC exams which will commence on Monday 26th July 2021.
- Year 11 will complete Task 2 which will lead, after Task 3 to the end of Preliminary Exams in Term 3.
 Term 4 will commence Year 12 HSC assessment Tasks in all subjects.
- Years 9 and 10 will have one task this Term.
- Years 7 and 8 have ongoing quizzes which will add to their overall grades.

Mathematics requires ongoing practice, through homework and revision. Revision is important because it allows students to improve their skill sets. Without proper attention in class and homework/revision your marks reflect your effort.

Leading up to an assessment task, revision should start early (not the night before). Closely examining the contents of your Notification will disclose the topics to be assessed. All Maths textbooks have chapter revision work, which should be completed well prior to the exam. Teachers will provide assistance for students who are struggling or extra work for students who have completed all the textbook questions.

HSIE

The HSIE department has been busily engaging with the rigours of a wide curriculum and external programs. This has culminated in a range of outstanding work by the students across the broad offering of HSIE subjects. Following are some highlights from this year:

Stage 5 Business Studies are combining with the local business community to try to solve a range of business issues. This

project involves flexible and creative thinking with an emphasis on group work. Each problem is a real-life issue, so the stakes are that much higher than abstract classroom content. This has resulted in an incredible level of application by the students, and they, as well as their adult mentors, are invigorated by the intellectual and practical challenges of the project.





Other real-life issues are demonstrated in the senior Geography project. This project enables the students to consider a geographical issue in the community and report its impact on the human and physical realms. One outstanding project involves the study of beachfront cafes and their impact on the beachfront in terms of pollution and landforms.

Some Stage 5 and Stage 6 History classes have been responding to a brief that instructs them to design a museum exhibit. The students have had to collect a range of primary, secondary and archaeological sources that comprehensively demonstrates, not only their understanding of the period, but how bias in the selection of sources and their written interpretations position the viewer to view the exhibit with a particular mindset. Two examples stand out: The World War I exhibit, and, from Ancient History, a series based on preserved human remains.

Similarly, Year 7 mostly focused on the preserved human remains of Otzi, the Ice Man. They did an amazing job in unravelling the mystery of the reasons and manner of his death. To come to an historical conclusion, the students needed to



immerse themselves in the physical evidence found around and, in his body, as well as the historical and autopsy reports based on the forensic study of Otzi. The students excelled at this challenging project and their enthusiasm for historical investigations has increased as the year progresses.

It is not only detective work that generates on overwhelmingly positive response. Students' creativity and disciplined approaches to coursework are piqued when provided with connections to shared experiences and motivations. Year 11 Modern History submitted entries to the Whitlam Institute's essay competition titled: "What matters to me". This laid the basis for their Historical Investigation – a research essay based on an aspect of modern history of their choice. Two of these are military based: The alleged war crimes committed by Australian troops in Afghanistan and the experiences of Australian war veterans from recent conflicts.

The students in Economics have been considering the role COVID-19 has played across the financial landscape of Australia. Business Studies reviewed statistics of unemployment from their own households – with surprising results, and Legal Studies students have been focusing on high profile local cases in the application of the theoretical tenants of the law.

HSIE students are enjoying a vibrant, diverse and richly sourced curriculum. Their teachers endeavour to make the classwork dynamic through the application of real-world scenarios combined with outstanding teaching. The students are engaged as they happily focus on the broad choice of subjects on offer in a context that will enable them to thrive in future study and workplace contexts.

Year 8 have also begun the planning process for the assessment of the topics and concepts explored in class this semester so far. Term 2 sees the students exploring the causes, effects, and solutions of bullying along with research of seeking help resources and strategies.

Year 9

On Thursday this week, the Year 9 PDHPE Cohort were lucky enough to have a visit from a current Tokyo Olympic Athlete.

Rohan Browning presented his Olympic journey to the St Paul's students, as part of the Olympics Unleashed program, presented by Optus.

Olympics Unleashed connects athletes with schools across the country to inspire students to find and follow their passion and provide lessons in goal setting, overcoming challenges and developing resilience.

Rohan Browning is an Australian sprinter. He represented his country in the 4×100 metres relay at the 2017 World Championships without qualifying for the final. He also competed in the 100 metres at the 2018 Commonwealth Games narrowly missing the final. Rohan has most recently qualified for the Tokyo Olympics 2021.

Rohan spoke of his Olympic journey, overcoming challenges and the privilege to compete in his chosen sport at the highest level. With the aim to help inspire the students at St Paul's Catholic College to be the best they can be – whether that is in school, at home, on the sporting field or with friends. The students were very engaged in Rohan's journey with some intriguing questions and positive feedback.

We are very fortunate to have the connection with the Australian Tokyo Olympic Athlete Community.

If the students finish in the top 10 individually or top 5 team places, they are eligible to compete in the State Championships

in late August.

As the competition timetable has the different age divisions competing at the same time on different courses across Thredbo, parents are responsible for their son/daughter's entry and supervision in all the events they participate in throughout the Championships.

Parent Volunteers: If you would like to volunteer at the championships you will be entitled to a discounted lift ticket for that day.

All students who participate will need to make their own travel and accommodation arrangements from Sydney. Students will need to bring their own equipment in order to participate.

EXEMPTION FROM ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL

From time to time the College receives applications for leave from families for a few days, to a week or more. Please note that the College is bound by the Education Act when determining whether leave can be granted. The Act delegates authority to the Principal to grant leave only in very specific circumstances related to serious or prolonged illness, and for involvement in accredited elite sporting competitions or the arts (students employed in film, television or theatre or engaged in cultural opportunities not available through the school or the diocese).

The Act does not allow Principals to grant leave from school for family holidays or overseas travel. Although this may frustrate some parents please understand that this is not a school decision.

LOST PROPERTY

Lost property is located at the College Reception in the Cardinal's Palace. If your son is missing any item(s) please ask him to check with the College Receptionist to determine whether it may have been handed in.

Please label your son's uniform items. Uniforms are expensive and when they have no identification, we cannot return them to the owner.

If your son has outgrown his school uniform please consider donating any item in good condition, particularly senior uniform grey shorts, trousers and blazers – this has proven to be a very helpful solution to many boys experiencing wardrobe 'malfunctions' during the course of the school day and is a great way to recycle and reduce landfill.
