PRAYER

This week the College, and the universal Church celebrate the shared Feast of Saint Paul and Saint Peter. These two great men of the early Church are often pictured together embracing one another. This portrayal speaks to us of the dual nature of the Church.

The Church's Petrine nature (after St Peter) refers to its teaching authority. Peter, who is sometimes referred to as the first among the disciples, was a leader that symbolised the unity of the early Church. Today the Church fulfils its Petrine role by instructing the faithful according to the Scriptures and guided by the Holy Spirit.

The Church's Pauline nature (after St Paul) refers to its evangelical character. The Church fulfils this role today by going out into the world, sharing the Good News, and inviting people to know and love Jesus and live according to his teachings.

Importantly, the mission of the Church is only fully realised when it embraces both roles.

As we celebrate the Feast of these two very different but equally faith filled men we pray:

Saint Peter and Saint Paul, by observing your example of faithfulness in God may we know the peace and joy that come from knowing and loving God. and by your intercession may we be brought closer to the heart of Christ, overcoming our own self-interest to serve those most in need in our world.

In our last newsletter I mentioned quite a few community service and learning enrichment activities but since then have seen our young men give of their all in the sporting arena also. Our

College Athletics Carnival was a triumph, particularly so for the number of Year 7 students that participated in every event possible throughout the day. Several long-standing records were broken on the day by students that strove for nothing less than their best including students in Years 7, 9, 10 and 12.

Special mention must be made of our Senior Students that, alongside their studies, have represented the College with distinction in this term. In the space of ten weeks the Class of 2022 have become the Broken Bay Opens Football Champions, Manly Warringah Opens Basketball Champions and Peninsula Cup Opens Rugby Champions, with several students having played in all three sides.

Finally, all these achievements are underpinned by the extraordinary generosity of our teaching and support staff. At our final assembly for the Term, I shared the following words of thanks for our teachers in front of the student body, who deserve to know how hard the staff work for them.

Last week we held our final assembly of the Term. The Ganbaru Cup is a Diocesan wide Japanese language enrichment program that some of our Year 8 students competed in recently. Ganbaru means in Japanese to "try ones best!" and that's certainly what our students did. Our Year 8 students gave up their time at recess and in their own time to practise and prepare for the competition.

218 students across 5 schools signed up for the 8-week blended learning enrichment program and 15 teams made it into the final contest round. All three of our teams made it into the finals and two of these teams made it into the top five teams of the contest. Congratulations to all the students.


The Year 7 RE classes had their first assessment this Term which included a combination of Art and Written explanation. Here are some of those pieces.
