This week students in Years 7 - 10 have completed the Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT) in Reading and Mathematics. The PAT suite provides the college with evidence-based assessment data that allows us to identify entry points for learning, plan effective teaching sequences and monitor student growth. Students have engaged well with the testing schedule and there will be opportunities for those who have missed the testing window to demonstrate their level of skill at this particular point in time.

As reported in the last newsletter students in Year 12 2023 have commenced their HSC study program. They are currently sitting or submitting their first HSC task in most subjects. While I would not like to overplay the importance of Year 12, the HSC year is for most the culmination of 13 years of education. I would be disappointed for any student to finish their HSC

As their first year of high school draws to a close, Year 7 have a renewed focus on finishing the year well. During our COURAGE assemblies, we have focussed on the College motto "Prima Primum -- First things first", highlighting the importance of getting back to basics and doing the simple things well. 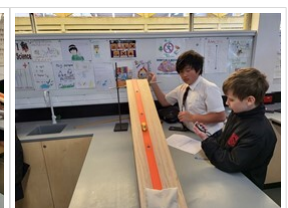

SCIENCE

Year 7 have been conducting scientific investigations to apply their observation and measurement skills. Students have been understanding how

- Calculating averages from data is usually more accurate than using just one result.
- Choosing the correct range and intervals for recording data is important to reach valid conclusions.
- Recording data in a table ensures that data is recorded in an organised way.



YEAR 9

Students have been modelling radioactive decay.

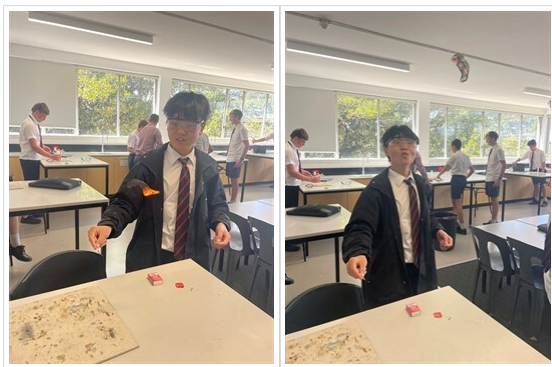
Radioactive decay is the name given to the natural process by which an atomic nucleus spontaneously transforms itself (decays) into another, releasing dangerous high energy emissions. The decay of radioactivity in a radioactive element can be modelled using cubes, dice, coins, or confectionery.

In decay, a radioactive parent **nucleus** randomly emits an alpha or beta particle and turns into a new daughter element. The daughter element is more stable.



TEA BAG ROCKET

The flow of rising hot air inside the cylinder creates a convection current of air, generating an upward force called lift. As the bag burns, it becomes both ash and smoke therefore losing its mass.



MAMMALIAN EYE DISSECTION

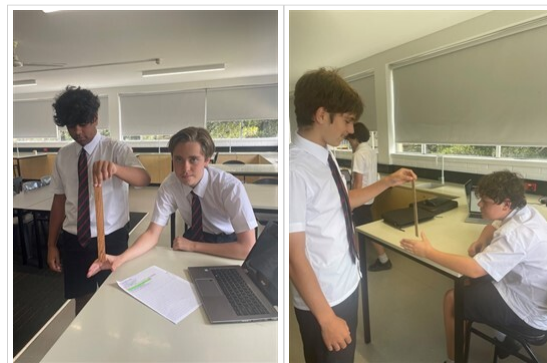
Dissecting a cow's eye is a high school laboratory activity that demonstrates concepts in biology, physics, anatomy, and physiology. Exploring an actual mammalian eye allows students to learn how the parts of the eye function and how vision operates through this hands-on activity. In addition, they can learn about human vision by drawing similarities between the cow and human eye.



REACTION TIME

The time between noticing something and then responding to it is known as reaction time.

We use our eyes and other sensory organs to detect what's going on around us. Understanding this information and deciding how to respond to it is the job of the nervous system. This controls everything we do and is made up of the brain, spinal cord and billions of nerve cells known as neurons.

ENGLISH

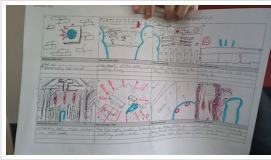
As we rapidly approach Christmas and the festive season, it's time to reflect on an eventful Term 4 and celebrate the learning and achievements of our wonderful students.

Year 7 have learnt all about the Fantasy genre and have been producing some great creative writing. In the classroom, teachers have helped the boys to craft highly descriptive sentences, using our 'super sentence' scaffold to elicit some evocative descriptions. For their final formal assessment, the boys composed the beginning of an original fantasy novel, complete with their own hand drawn maps. Year 7 are also currently busy preparing for the inaugural inter-class spelling bee to be held at the end of term, with prizes on offer for the champions.

This same explicit approach to the teaching of writing has helped our Year 8 students compose some excellent narratives for their final assessment. To finish off the year, they have been researching topical issues in sport, with a focus on learning about the art of persuasion and using language to construct a convincing argument.



Year 9 have been studying film this term, with a particular focus on how suspense is created through film techniques. After a close study of Alfred Hitchcock's 'The Birds', the boys have been busy writing, storyboarding, directing, filming and editing their own suspenseful short films. We look forward to viewing the final products at the end of the term.



As a way of preparing for the demands of senior English, Year 10 have been engaging in a comparative study of texts and contexts, with a focus on George Orwell's 'Animal Farm' and Neil Blomkamp's 'Elysium'. While these texts are products of vastly different socio-political contexts, the boys have discovered how they both arrive at remarkably similar conclusions about the nature of our humanity, particularly in relation to power and control.

With the HSC now complete for another year, I'd like to thank Ms Hogarth, Ms Weight and Mr Varadi-Beothy for their efforts with the class of 2022. From running holidays classes to consistently providing quality feedback on draft responses, these teachers have worked tirelessly to ensure the boys had every chance of success in their final exams. As Term 4 draws to a close, our new Year 12's will be completing their first HSC assessment, and it has been pleasing to see them working hard and seeking teacher feedback in preparation for this important task. A special thanks must also go to Mr Reid who has been generously teaching the English Studies class during Term 4.
