On behalf of the College Staff and our Student Leaders it is my pleasure to welcome you all to the 2023 academic year. Whether you are a new family to the College or one that is continuing with us for another year we thank you for the great honour of choosing St Paul's as your partner in educating the young men in our care.

As you are aware, we begin this year with the announcement from Bishop Anthony at the end of 2022 that St Paul's will be transitioning to a co-educational model commencing with our Year 7 enrolment in 2025. This is an exciting prospect and one that will involve a great deal of planning and preparation. Catholic Schools Broken Bay has already established project teams to focus on ensuring that our facilities meet the new and expanding needs of our students and, most importantly, that we support the holistic education of our students from Kindergarten to Year 12 within the Manly precinct and our surrounding community of schools - offering opportunities for continued growth and an enrolment pathway for every family. Already our Parent Advisory group has met to begin giving input to this process with further opportunities planned for our students, staff and families to do the same.

We are fortunate to welcome a number of specialist staff to the College this year:

Mr John Hunt, **Director of Wellbeing for Learning**. John comes to us from Christian Brothers Lewisham, where he was an experienced leader of wellbeing and science teacher, specialising in Biology. John has made a wonderful start working with the Leaders of Wellbeing team and takes up the role of Leader of Wellbeing for Year 9.

Ms Adeline Wang, **HSIE Teacher**. Adeline is a teacher of Commerce, History and Geography with a strong interest in Economics. She has most recently taught at St Pius X College at Chatswood where she also embraced the co-curricular life of the College. Adeline will also be a Year 9 PC teacher.

Mr Graeme Stewart, **Technologies Teacher**. Graeme commenced his career at St Paul's as a graduate teacher and returns to us after working with the Department of Education, most recently at Mosman High School. He specialises in Industrial Technology, Timber and is a successful VET Construction teacher.

College. April brings a love of music and experience as a band and music program leader as well as experience as a teacher of Stage 4 Mandatory Technologies and Food Technology. April will also be a Year 7 PC Teacher this year.

Ms Katy Gilles, **Japanese Teacher**. Katy is a very experienced teacher of a number of languages who specialises in Japanese. Katy joins us on a part-time basis, supplementing our LOTE department as our Year 7 and 8 enrolment continues to grow. She has experience developing face to face and online programs that are used in many schools, and a background in both boys and co-ed settings.

Mr Mark Brown, **Science Teacher**. Mark is an experienced Science teacher with a strong background in senior courses. After some years working as a trainer in the IT industry Mark returns to the secondary classroom with a great breadth of knowledge and industry experience.

Mr Chris Govers, **English, HSIE and Religion Teacher**. Chris is a remarkably experienced teacher and leader in Catholic schools who has worked with our students on a temporary basis over the past twelve months. He has developed a wonderful classroom with our students over this time and we are pleased to welcome him into a full-time role this year.

Mr Ollie Signorini, **Mathematics Teacher**. Ollie is a beginning teacher who comes to St Paul's very highly recommended by his teacher mentors and students. With the background to teach the highest levels of Mathematics, Ollie joins us in a part-time role this year.

Ms Tina Friede, **Music Teacher and Learning Support**. A very talented musician and music teacher, Tina joins us in a temporary role this Term. Tina is well known to our students having worked at St Paul's in a relieving role last year across a number of learning areas.

TEACHING AND LEARNING

As we begin the new year it is appropriate for each of us to consider our goals for 2023, and what is required to achieve these goals. My goal is to see each student experience learning growth appropriate for one year's learning.

For this to occur it is our responsibility to provide the right learning environment for each student, for each teacher to provide a positive learning experience, and for each student to actively engage in his learning, applying himself not only in class, but more broadly with commitment to assessment and consolidation of learning. This requires each student to be ready for learning by having the equipment necessary for each class – appropriate stationery, exercise/textbooks, charge computers, sports uniform; whatever is necessary to maximise engagement in a particular lesson.

I often harp on about the importance of consolidation of learning. The concept of working memory, particularly the distinction between short and long-term memory is particularly relevant to this. In its simplest explanation initial learning is held in our short-term memory. Active rehearsal of this content, through revision and consolidation, activates the long-term memory, allowing for relevant recall as required. In an educational setting this is particularly true when building on prior knowledge and examinations.

Mr Hunt, Director of Wellbeing for Learning, and I will be presenting to Year 7 and 8 students an outline on the skills and practices required to successfully consolidate their learning. A Year 7 and Year 8 parent presentation on study skills and general information will be held on Monday 6th March. The teaching staff will continue to work with all year

groups supporting them in developing the tools for academic and social success.

We can support each student at the College on his learning journey if we work together as a team striving to ensure each student does his best and is his best.

TECHNOLOGIES

We have a fun and engaging Term ahead in the Technologies KLA.

Year 7 will be engaging with the design process as they develop a range of different products. As part of their mixed materials course, they will have an opportunity to work with acrylic, timber and pewter as well as develop CAD skills.

Year 8 will enter the Term developing a range of core kitchen skills. These skills will be beneficial as they get to make (and enjoy) a range of delicious meals in our kitchens over the Term.

Across the Technologies KLA, Years 9 and 10 will be engaging in a range of their selected subjects from iSTEM to Food Technology, Timber, Multimedia and IST. Some standout projects include the website development unit in IST, students will learn how to develop and build robust and thoughtful websites. Two projects taking place in the workshops consist of a folding table and jewellery box. These projects help develop core woodworking and design skills. This Term there is a focus on working safely and responsibly in and around the workshops.

SCIENCE

We are excited to welcome two new teachers to the Science KLA this Term, Mr Mark Brown and Mr John Hunt. Thanks in advance to both teachers for their hard work and dedication in helping our students to become the best scientists they can be. This year we will continue to put literacy at the front and centre of our pedagogy by teaching our students the writing skills they need to communicate clearly and accurately.

The learning focus for Year 7 this Term will be working scientifically in the laboratory. Students will develop the skills

they need to choose appropriate equipment to make accurate measurements. These skills will enable them to prepare, separate and analyse mixtures.

Year 8 will consider how scientific discoveries about the properties of elements, compounds and mixtures relate to their uses in everyday life. This understanding underlies the development of new materials.

The learning focus for Year 9 this Term explains how models, theories and laws about matter have been refined as new scientific evidence becomes available. This has led to the development of the Periodic table, a tool which organises information in a logical way and shows the relationships between elements and compounds.

Chemical reactions occur at different rates. Year 10 students will consider how some reactions occur slowly while others occur very quickly. Understanding the factors that drive chemical reactions is essential when monitoring and managing chemical processes.

The students should have homework after each lesson, should they have completed all work they should review their class notes.

HSIE

The boys have a very interesting Term ahead of them in HSIE.

Year 7 students start the Term exploring the work of historians in helping us make sense of the past. They will look at how historians act as detectives: searching for clues, analysing sources and developing theories to solve the mysteries of the past. Their focus study on the mysteries of Mungo Man should get many young minds thinking!

The students in Year 8 are diving into the Middle Ages for their main area of focus in History. They will be looking at what life was like for people from different groups in Medieval Europe and examine how society was structured. They should particularly enjoy looking at how the building of castles defined life in the period and maybe more importantly, what was involved in knocking them down during a siege.

In Year 9 students are turning their eyes to Australia and looking back at what life was like at the beginning of the 20th Century. They will pull apart the reasons why the individual colonies decided to combine as one country and look at some of the major challenges they faced because of their decision.

Year 10 students will focus on the tense era of the Cold War. They will explore the changing relations between two global superpowers and look specifically at events where the War thawed, and conflict became heated. The students should particularly enjoy looking at how the Cold War was fought through international sport.

In Geography, the Year 10 students will begin to unpack the issue of Environmental Change and explore its implications for our society. Of particular focus will be the impact of human development and the students will be challenged to consider their own contribution to global change and potential solutions that could be implemented.

Students studying Commerce are delving into the topic of 'Consumer and Financial Decisions', a topic that will hopefully help connect them to the wider, consumer driven world that exists outside the classroom. They will examine a range of issues that relate to financial management with a particular focus on protections enshrined for individuals. Hopefully this will help them acquire skills that will be greatly beneficial in the real world.

ENGLISH

Year 7

The English faculty have been impressed with the energy and enthusiasm that Year 7 have brought with them to the beginning of the year. This Term, they are studying autobiographies and will be reading widely from a range of non-fiction texts. Year 7 classes will also be attending the library once a fortnight as part of their English program, and all boys are expected to borrow and engage in regular wide reading.

Year 8

Year 8 are beginning the year by studying how suspense is created in film. This unit contains engaging texts that provide a springboard for us to introduce the boys to an explicit writing scaffold, which is designed to facilitate the composition of increasingly sophisticated analytical sentences. Year 8 will also be regularly visiting the library and are expected to engage in wide reading to supplement their in-class study.

Year 9

With NAPLAN occurring in Week 6 of Term 1, Year 9 are revising the art of persuasive writing and focussing on core literacy skills that provide the basis of successful writing. This will lead into a study of the language of advertising with a focus on how meaning is shaped in a range of visual and written texts.

Year 10

Year 10 are studying a unit entitled 'Living the Dream', which involves a close study of John Steinbeck's novel 'Of Mice and Men' and Gabrielle Muccino's film 'The Pursuit of Happiness'. This unit is designed to build important analytical writing skills that are imperative for success in Stage 6 English.

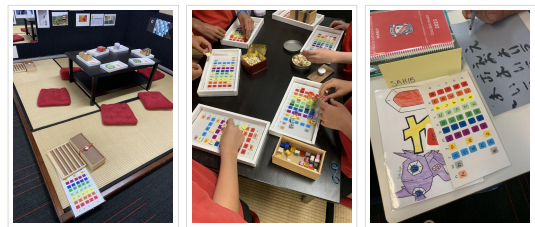
JAPANESE

Students studying Japanese have settled into the class routines well. Already listening and speaking in Japanese from lesson 1. Students have learnt about the rules associated with bowing in Japanese and regularly bowing throughout their lessons.

Year 8 Term 1 Overview

Students will learn to recognise all the letters of the hiragana alphabet as well as the differences and uses of the 4 scripts: katakana, hiragana, kanji & romaji. They experiment with basic greetings & learn to use kanji for numbers & months. Students develop their skills in how to learn a language by teaching themselves and others.

They will also learn about and celebrate some festivals in Japanese, including- Valentine's Day and White Day and compete in the Language perfect World Championships in March.



Year 9 Term 1 Overview

Students learn to recognise all the letters of the katakana alphabet. They experiment with more sophisticated ways of introducing themselves to others and ways of linking text to make comparisons.

They will also revise festivals and further investigate Hinamatsuri (Girls Day festival) by making a hina doll display and eating chirashizushi.

Furthermore, students revise vocabulary for Japanese foods and learn how to order these in a restaurant for an excursion to Waka restaurant later in the Term.

Year 10 Term 1 Overview

We started the year with a New Year cleanse by revising the festival Setsubun. We practiced the phrase Oni wa soto, fuku wa uchi- Evil spirits out and good fortune in. Thank you to our oni (demon)- Charlie who kindly accepted having dried soybeans thrown at him for this festival.



This Term in Year 10 students are learning about the topic of pets in a more sophisticated way. It begins with Hachiko, the most famous Japanese pet, and moves on to the influence of animals on our lives. Students learn about native Japanese animals such as tanuki and inoshishi. We look at pet ownership rates in Japan and Australia, consider religious and cultural influences on attitudes towards certain animals, and finish with a look at Ainu culture.

Waseda students are back to St Paul's after a few years of absence, and we couldn't be happier to welcome them back!

In the past St Paul's has hosted students from our "sister school" Waseda, in Tokyo. This year we are currently looking for homestay families to host a student from July 23rd to August 3rd. PDHPE

2023 promises to be another fulfilling year for students of PDHPE at St Paul's Catholic College Manly. Each year has a carefully assembled pattern of learning planned to provide valuable lifelong learning, develop wide-ranging skillsets, and promote healthy habits - as well as test and challenge students into new thinking and ways of doing things. A cursory overview of the year ahead is as follows:

Year 7 begins with a focus on navigating change, appropriate to the time of year, before progressing into the values that underpin getting along with others in Term Two, developing health savviness in Term 3 and concluding the year with the always fun and engaging 'get active, stay active'.

Year 8 commences the year with a unit designed to help them with difficult decisions and skills in emergency situations, before moving onto learning about equality, rights and responsibilities in Term 2, an introduction to the impact of alcohol and drug use on communities in Term 3, before wrapping 2023 with the challenging "Move it" unit - a physical unit challenging their presumptions about their own fitness.

In Term one Year 9 will be focusing on responding to questions around how to enhance athletic/skill-based performance, then looking at sensitive issues around identity and building relationships in Term 2. In Term 3 they engage in the fun and collaborative work around movement composition and game strategies, before rounding out the year with a look into inclusion and a holistic view of health in 'Commit to be fit', their Term 4 unit.

Year 10 hit the ground running with the innovative unit 'Leadership', whose unit name is most appropriate, but also encourages students to think outside the box for game design and creation. Term 2 is a crucial unit of learning for students of this age, 'Stepping Out' is a unit that empowers the students with knowledge, skills and strategies around tricky issues like drinking, partying, consent and general safety. Term 3 focuses on more worldly concepts around social justice and health promotion, particularly in marginalised communities. Finally,

Term 4, their final compulsory term of PDHPE is all about future skills and preparing them for life beyond school.

PASS students will be studying the Strand A content, which is an awesome balance of theoretical but useful knowledge about how the body moves, event planning and sport management, and the reality of physical activity in Australia, whilst at the same time enjoying the more practical units involving practice and performance in Volleyball, World games and sporting appraisal.

Our senior students will be challenged to learn about, understand, practice, live out (where possible) and then revise revise revise REWISE the content underpinning the Stage 6 PDHPE syllabus. Our PDHPE team have been deeply analysing and planning strategies to focus on continuing to develop strengths in our HSC performance, whilst seeking to address a few blind spots, to maximise student achievement in the competitive HSC course.

The dedicated PDHPE team consists of Mr Anthony Noyes, Miss Hannah Thornton, and Mr Benjamin Rowse - each brings their own unique experience, skillsets, talents and energies to their classes in 2023, and will be seeking to make learning as engaging as possible, whilst also seeking to address literacy targets and maximising learning growth for our wide-range of diverse learners in our classes.

CREATIVE AND PERFORMING ARTS (CAPA)

This year we welcome two new teachers to the Creative Arts department, Miss April Pulanco and Miss Tina Friede, both of whom are experienced teachers and accomplished musicians. They bring a wealth of knowledge and expertise to their roles, respectively.

This year, St Paul's will once again offer tuition on the following instruments: guitar, bass guitar, drums, piano, saxophone, trumpet and voice.

Additional instruments may be offered throughout the year, pending student interest. Lessons will begin in Week 2, with Stage and Contemporary band rehearsals commencing in Week 3.

In the classroom our Years 7-10 Music classes will be focusing on the following areas of study:

- Year 7 will be focusing on the topic 'What Is Music'. It provides them with an opportunity to look at a variety of styles and artists and participate in performance, composition and listening tasks with a composition assessment at the end of term.

- Year 8 will be studying Aussie Rock. They will be performing well known pieces in both small groups and individually.
- Stage 5 students will be focussing on Music of a Culture in term one. They will be introduced to the music of a variety of different cultures, from African music, to Cuban, Japanese, Polynesian and more. They will learn the basics of composing and apply those skills to compose their own piece of music that represents a culture of their choice.

Visual Arts

This Term Year 7 are exploring the genre of the still life “Vanitas” in the unit of work “sweet poison”. The Vanitas is a symbolic exploration of distractions of life, such as junk food and too much screen time. Students will arrange objects to photograph and draw using a range of art materials.

Year 8 have begun their unit “Life In The Undergrowth”. Students will start with the creation of a logo for their space exploration mission to a new planet. The project will include drawing and painting of a unique insect design. Students will construct sculptures of their monsters and design landscapes of the unique biomes they inhabit.

Stage 5 will explore their critical and historical study through the work of Chuck Close.

With the Open Day fast approaching on 2nd March, our wonderful students are working hard to have their work showcased, from both visual arts and music. Visual artworks will be on display and our musicians will be performing their repertoire under the marquee. We hope you can join us.
