Entrepreneurship Program Sparks Innovation with Guest Speakers

The Broken Bay Cross-Campus Entrepreneurship course has kicked off with two powerhouse guest speakers this term, bringing real-world insight and inspiration into the virtual classroom.





First up was Matt Esterman, educational consultant and entrepreneur, who shared his journey from classroom teacher and school leader to launching his own businesses in app development and AI consulting. Matt emphasised the value of listening, problem-solving, and working with great people. His key message: "You're not selling a product, you're selling what people feel when they use it."

One student reflected, "It made me realise you don't need to be a tech expert- you just need to solve a real problem." Another added, "He made the idea of starting something feel less scary." Students appreciated the authenticity of Matt's story and the clear message that entrepreneurial thinking begins with curiosity and empathy.

Later in the term, students were treated to a high-energy creativity masterclass from innovation futurist Nils Vesk. Nils shared practical ways to generate and refine ideas, using relatable exampleslike a cupcake stand that cleverly used PayID to attract customers- to show how small changes can lead to big results. Introducing tools like the SCAMPER technique, he challenged students to exercise their creative muscles and embrace "idea sprints."

One Year 10 student shared, "I liked how Nils gave real examples of how simple ideas can become a business. The cupcake story with PayID was genius." Another said, "The 'use your brain like a muscle' idea really stuck with me. I'm going to try the 20 ideas in 5 minutes challenge."

These sessions not only expanded students' entrepreneurial toolkits but also boosted their confidence to think differently and take initiative. Many students have since begun developing their own business ideas, with growing enthusiasm and collaboration across schools. With projects like the Sydney Metro Minds Challenge underway and pitch presentations on the horizon, these learning experiences weren't just motivational- they were practical, energising, and aligned with the entrepreneurial mindset we aim to build.

Entrepreneurship is alive and well in our schools- and it's only just getting started.


